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Victims' Rights: Request or Waive

 \mathbf{V} ictims' rights laws were established in Arizona by policy-makers who believed that victims should have the right to choose whether or not to participate in the justice process. They intended the laws to promote а sense of empowerment for many victims who feel helpless after victimization.

From that point forward, victims of crime in Arizona have a constitutional right to be treated with fairness, respect and dignity, and to be free from intimidation, harassment or abuse throughout the justice process. All state, county and municipal justice agencies and courts in Arizona are required to perform certain duties to ensure victims receive their rights. Additionally, a victim, upon request, may exercise or change his/her decision to request/waive rights at any time during the justice process.

Many victim's rights are automatic. For example, a victim has: 1) the right to refuse an interview, deposition, or other discovery request by the defendant, the defendant's

"Arizona Rules of Criminal Procedure - Victims' Rights," victims have a duty to implement Any victim the victim. If the victim is a corporation, partnership, association or other legal entity and has requested notice of the hearings to which it is entitled, that legal entity will need to immediately designate a representative and provide the representative's contact information to the prosecutor and to any other agency from which notice is requested by the Thereafter, only the victim. designated representative will be entitled to assert victims' rights on behalf of that legal entity. Any change in designation must be provided in writing to the prosecutor and to any other agency from which notice is requested by the victim. Failure to keep the address and telephone number current or to designate a representative of a legal entity will be considered a waiver of notification rights under this Rule.

Victims' Rights Here To Stay

Victims' rights are here to stay. It is the hope of Arizona policy-makers that the victims' rights statutes, together with the procedures and orders, will ensure that no victim of crime is overlooked throughout the justice system.
